



On Holy Thursday, April 11, 1675, Father Jacques Marquette offered the first parochial Mass in the Illinois Country at Utica in the presence of 5,000 Native Americans. Father Marquette and his companion, Louis Joliet, took possession of this land in the name of Jesus Christ and founded the Mission of the Immaculate Conception. A monument in his honor stands in the northeast corner of the property. That mission eventually became the Church of Saint Mary. In 1858 a small frame church was built which was destroyed by fire seventeen years later and a brick and stone church was built. The Reverend Canon Jeremiah Moynihan was appointed the first resident pastor in 1884. The Reverend Francis J. O'Reilly succeeded Canon Moynihan in 1888 and in the same year erected the present church. In September 1986, Saint Mary's Church was completely redecorated. Though damaged, it survived the Utica tornado of 2004 and was quickly restored.

Meditation from The Word Among Us - November 27th

Come, let us walk in the light of the Lord!

Welcome to Advent! May you be deeply blessed during this season as you prepare for the coming of Christ. And what better way to begin this season than with the invitation in today's first reading: "Come, let us walk in the light of the Lord!"

At Mass today, the first candle on the Advent wreath will be lit. Then, for the next three Sundays, the light coming from that wreath will grow stronger as one more candle is lit. And that's how Advent is supposed to be for us spiritually: four whole weeks of coming more and more deeply into the light of Christ. There are lots of ways you can let that light grow stronger in you as Christmas approaches.

- Bring yourself to the light through daily prayer. Spending just a few minutes a day in Jesus' presence can open your heart to the warmth of his love. You can even use this magazine to help you.
- ♦ Enlighten your heart and mind through spiritual reading or a Bible study. Let Jesus "instruct you in his ways" so that you can "walk in his paths".
- Ask the Lord to shine a light on those parts of your life where you are content to live in the shadows. Then, take those areas to the Sacrament of Reconciliation and do as St. Paul says: turn from darkness and "put on the armor of light".
- Spread the light of Christ by joining other believers to serve those in need. Provide them with meals or Christmas gifts. Bring supplies to a homeless shelter. Pray for them.

We don't have to walk in darkness! Every time you turn to the Lord in these ways, his light in you becomes brighter and shines out more clearly. So let the Advent wreath remind you that Jesus, the light of the world, can overcome all darkness.

Come and walk in the light of the Lord!



Blessing of an Advent Wreath

All make the sign of the cross as the leader says:

Our help is in the name of the Lord.

R: Who made heaven and earth.

Read Isaiah 9: 1-2, 5-6 or Isaiah 64: 2-7

With hands joined, the leader says: Lord our God, we praise you for your Son, Jesus Christ: he is Emmanuel, the hope of the peoples, he is the wisdom that teaches and guides us, he is the Savior of every nation.

Lord our God, let your blessing come upon us as we light the candles of this wreath. May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise to bring us salvation. May he come quickly and not delay. We ask this though Christ our Lord.

R: Amen.

Advent is our time of waiting. During Advent, we get ready to celebrate the birth of Jesus. The word "Advent" means "coming". Advent is the four weeks before Christmas when we prepare for Christ's coming.

The candles represent each week of the Advent season. Three of the candles are purple because the color violet is a liturgical color that signifies a time of prayer, penance and sacrifice. The candle lit on the third week of Advent is pink/rose. That Sunday is called Gaudete Sunday. This particular week is considered a time of joy, a time of being thankful for all that has been given—the promise of the Savior who has come, who is present, and who promises a return.

FOUNDATION 1: EMPOWERING EVANGELIZATION

SO AS TO SHARE THE SAVING NAME OF JESUS

We often hear the word "evangelization." But what does it really mean, and how are we called to evangelize as Catholics? What does evangelization have to do with the Growing Disciples Pastoral Planning initiative?



To dig deeper into this, and into each of the five foundations upon which Growing Disciples is rooted, Bishop Louis Tylka is presenting a series of video discussions with different individuals from across the diocese. Watch the first video on evangelization at CDOP.org/pastoral-plan/five-foundations or on the Diocese of Peoria Facebook page.

In this video, **Bishop Tylka** and **Father Adam Cesarek**, pastor of St. Mary's Catholic Church in Pontiac, Ill., discuss the following, and more:

- Evangelization means bringing the Good News of Jesus into every human situation and seeking to convert individuals and society by the divine power of the Gospel itself. (Definition from the USCCB's National Plan for Evangelization)
- **We are all called to evangelize.** But in order to evangelize, we need to first fully experience who Jesus is for ourselves. This involves converting our hearts daily.
- National culture and trends regarding religion are much different today than they were even a few decades ago, so the way that we approach evangelization must change, too.
- Through Growing Disciples, we are evaluating how we can be better stewards of our resources in order to follow God's call to go and make disciples in the way it is needed today.
