

On Holy Thursday, April 11, 1675, Father Jacques Marquette offered the first parochial Mass in the Illinois Country at Utica in the presence of 5,000 Native Americans. Father Marquette and his companion, Louis Joliet, took possession of this land in the name of Jesus Christ and founded the Mission of the Immaculate Conception. A monument in his honor stands in the northeast corner of the property. That mission eventually became the Church of Saint Mary. In 1858 a small frame church was built which was destroyed by fire seventeen years later and a brick and stone church was built. The Reverend Canon Jeremiah Moynihan was appointed the first resident pastor in 1884. The Reverend Francis J. O'Reilly succeeded Canon Moynihan in 1888 and in the same year erected the present church. In September 1986, Saint Mary's Church was completely redecorated. Though damaged, it survived the Utica tornado of 2004 and was quickly restored.

## Gospel Meditation for October 12th

One of them ... returned, glorifying God.

Jesus had healed ten people afflicted with leprosy, but only one of them returned to give him thanks. We might wonder why the others didn't come back. Maybe they couldn't connect the dots: God himself had healed them on their way. It seems that only this one person—a Samaritan—realized that he had been in the presence of the divine. And he didn't just say, "Thank you," either. He fell at Jesus' feet and worshipped God "in a loud voice".

This can be a model for us. Our own gratitude can lead us to worship the One who has given us abundant life, both now and forever.

We can worship the Lord in many ways, but today, let's imitate the Samaritan in today's Gospel:

He glorified God in a loud voice. You can worship the Lord in silent prayer, but giving praise to God out loud expresses your gratitude in a deliberate, concrete way. As your praise reaches the heavens, your heart will be lifted up as well. That's why the psalmist writes, "Bless our God, you peoples; loudly sound his praise".

He fell at the feet of Jesus. Worship also involves our posture. That's why we stand and kneel at Mass. Maybe you like to pray in your favorite chair each morning. But occasionally, especially when you are offering praise and thanksgiving to the Lord, you might try standing, kneeling, or even lying prostrate on the floor. In all these ways, you are expressing your love and gratitude to the Lord with your body.

At Mass today, sing out your praise! Join the choir "in a loud voice" and worship the Lord with all your heart. Kneel in adoration before the King of kings. Rejoice because the Lord says to you, as he did to the Samaritan, "Your faith has saved you".

"Sing to the Lord a new song, for he has done wondrous deeds".


